



June 21<sup>st</sup> is National Indigenous Peoples Day in Canada. On this day and throughout the month of June, we celebrate the contributions, culture, and heritage of the First Nations, Inuit, and Metis peoples. Although these groups share some similarities, they each have their own distinct heritage, language, cultural practices, and spiritual beliefs. This particular date, June 21<sup>st</sup>, significantly coincides with summer solstice, the longest day of the year. For many generations, Indigenous communities have celebrated their culture and heritage at the time of summer solstice.

The Summer Solstice Indigenous Festival takes place annually in Ottawa. This event was established in 1996; it is a multi-disciplinary arts festival, incorporating different mediums of artist expression, that brings the Indigenous community together to share knowledge and celebrate Canada's diverse Indigenous cultures.<sup>1</sup>

National Indigenous Day came to be through consultation and statements of support from several Indigenous groups. Beginning in 1982, the [National Indian Brotherhood \(now the Assembly of the First Nations\)](#) advocated for the celebration of Indigenous culture and heritage with the creation of National Aboriginal Solidarity Day. In 1995, at a national conference of Indigenous and non-Indigenous people known as the Sacred Assembly, the prospect of a day devoted to recognizing Indigenous heritage was again raised. That same year, [the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples](#) recommended the designation of a National First Peoples Day. In 1996, former Governor General of Canada, Romeo LeBlanc, announced National Aboriginal Day (now National Indigenous Peoples Day), through the [Proclamation Declaring June 21 of Each Year as National Aboriginal Day](#). On June 21, 2017, Prime Minister Trudeau issued a [statement](#) announcing the intention to rename this day National Indigenous Peoples Day.
